



14 GRANTS AWARDED \$54,895.00 SINCE 2019



ASA has broadened our horizons in amphibian conservation and offered Instituto Curicaca an environment of exchange with other institutions around the world. A Start-up Grant was the starting point to catapult our ideas for the conservation of the Admirable Redbelly Toad involving local communities and agroforest. At first, working for the conservation of amphibians in the south of Brazil felt like an isolated effort, a shooting star whose small and fleeting light seemed insignificant. That changed when, with support from ASA, we felt like part of a huge galaxy of amphibian conservationists from around the world. *Alexandre Krob, Brazil*

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Being awarded an ASA-Start-up Grant allowed us to do much more than only start carrying out the Atelopus project systematically and obtain a lot of information for the highly threatened species Three-colored Harlequin Toad. Starting to implementing the project helped us attract further funding to our activities. Thanks to ASA, we were able to make connections with international organizations that support the Bolivian Amphibian Initiative, such as Synchronicity Earth, and thus be able to work for more amphibian species in need, besides training and encouraging students, and initiating an approach with the communities where threatened amphibians of Bolivia live. ~Patricia Mendoza-Miranda, Bolivia

TO FUTURE LEADERS AWARDED SINCE 2019





FUNDED PROJECTS IN 14 COUNTRIES SINCE 2019









The support from ASA has been fundamental for us. With one of their grants, we initiated a project in Ecuador to conserve the emblematic Jambato (Atelopus ignescens). As a result, the Jambato Alliance was born. In less than a year, the alliance has generated collaborative and interdisciplinary work strategies to continue research and conservation of this species. ASA's Infectious Disease Mitigation Grants program aims to counter infectious diseases affecting amphibians. We fund innovative projects focused on understanding, prevention, and mitigation of disease spread, safeguarding at-risk amphibians and their ecosystems.




